General Meeting Agenda for April 12th, 2022

Education Workshop | Eastern Monarch Butterfly Farm | 6:30pm

Dave O'Donnell, the owner of Eastern Monarch Butterfly Farm, will present "The Current State of the Eastern Monarch Butterfly Population" and discuss the many factors, especially disappearing habitat, that are contributing to the decline of the species.

While people sometimes feel hopeless in reversing the pernicious negative impacts human activities have had on the natural environment, Monarchs can help empower and inspire us to protect that environment. Concern for the iconic Eastern Monarch Butterfly has helped bring many people together, regardless of their ideological differences, for a common cause. Protecting and restoring habitat for the Eastern Monarch Butterfly

benefits all pollinators and results in many positive impacts on the environment. David O'Donnell is a self-taught naturalist dedicated to promoting an awareness of the declining biodiversity of the natural envi-

ronment that surrounds us. Educating people about the complex relationships between flora and fauna and promoting our ability to coexist with the natural world has been the goal of Eastern Monarch Butterfly

Farm since 1998. As a self-funded organization, funds raised through native plant sales and educational presentations are used here in Western New York to support pollinator projects and to promote Monarch Butterfly and native plant recovery today and for the future.

In Case You Missed it...

At our March meeting, we were excited to hear from environmental artist, Alexis Oltmer. The artist explained how she was

both saddened and inspired by the magnitude of plastic pollution she collected at the 40+ beach cleanups she organized

and participated in at our local waterways. Reflecting on this disturbing issue, she used her imagination and artistic talent to call attention to this environmental crisis in an unusual way, creating a exhibition entitled, "An Unnatural Diet," now on permanent display at the Aquarium of Niagara.

The artist brought along fascinating samples of her work and showed us slides of her finished project. Her exhibit depicts various species of our local fish population most impacted by plastic pollution. Oltmer created the marine specimens with

the collected plastic, which was then molded and sealed in resin. Her unique exhibition is both beautiful and thought provoking, hopefully

causing the viewer to reflect on their own roll in this global threat and motivating individual change toward a more eco-friendly

lifestyle.


grade for about a quarter mile.


NEW GUIDEBOOK: PEAKS AND PONDS

ERIE COUNTY FOREST HIKE-MARCH 5th

Spirits were high as our friendly group of eight hikers savored the snow-covered Silent Wood and Old Scarbuck trails at Erie County Forest for a late winter outing. We thoroughly enjoyed mild winter temperatures and navigated the bridges and hills easily with microspikes. At a steep icy



scent, Adirondack-style butt-sliding was the method chosen by some of the adventurous folks in our group! Wildlife tracks were aplenty, and a fun reminder that many animals make their home here. Much of this area had been abandoned farmland, which the county purchased about 90 years ago. The Civilian Conservation Corps planted evergreens amongst the existing hardwood trees. It is impressive

to see the expansive tracts of giant evergreens that have shot far upwards over 9 decades. Occasionally, wooden signs serve to identify the trees including spruce, red and white pines, sugar maple, ash and black cherry, thus highlighting the area's educa-



tion mission for visitors. We paused at the iconic "Bridge Too Far" to view Dresser Creek, actively flowing underneath nature's unique ice forms. The hike was a delightful way to spend the day, reconnecting with ADK friends and being ac-

tive in one of our area's most idyllic winter offerings.
