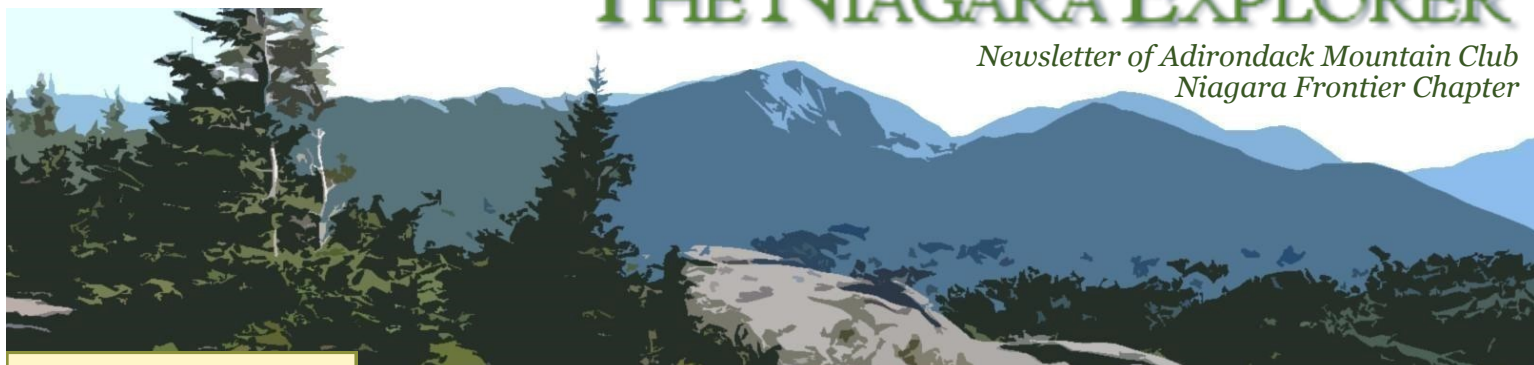




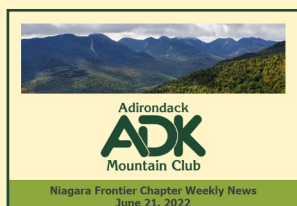

ADK Releases New Edition of "Ski and Snowshoe Trails in the Adirondacks"

ADK has released a new edition of its winter guidebook, *Ski and Snowshoe Trails in the Adirondacks*, by Tony Goodwin.

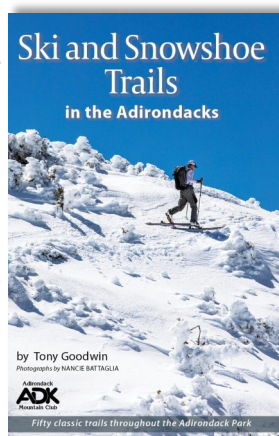
First published in 2003, the second edition of ADK's winter guidebook is a comprehensive collection of fifty popular and lesser-known adventures for all ability levels throughout the Adirondack Park. It includes the iconic trips like Mount Marcy and the Whiteface Mountain Toll Road, as well as lesser-known destinations, such as Hoffman Notch, Berrymill Flow, and Moxham Mountain.

The guidebook features GPS coordinates for trailheads and parking areas, page map sketches by illustrator Terry

Brosseau, and scores of photographs by well-known regional photographer Nancie Battaglia. Information about winter safety, round-trip distances, and difficulty ratings for skiers and snowshoers are also included throughout the book.

The focus will be to introduce some of the major Native, Indigenous cultural teachings, the impact of unresolved historical traumas, and how we can develop more



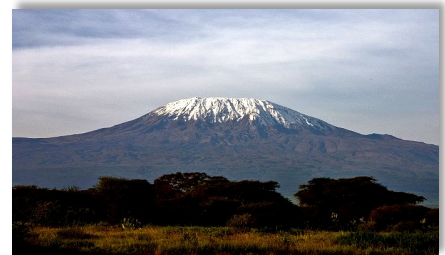
respectful relationships with each other. There will be time for Q&A's and members are encouraged to participate.

Wilderness First Aid (WFA) Training October 15, 2022

This hybrid Wilderness First Aid (WFA) course is designed for an individual or small group that travels beyond pavement and into the outdoors. The course consists of 8 hours of online learning and 8 hours of in-person training and practice scenarios. The outdoor workshop takes place on Saturday, October 15, 2022, at UB's Letchworth Woods from 9 am to 5 pm, rain or shine.

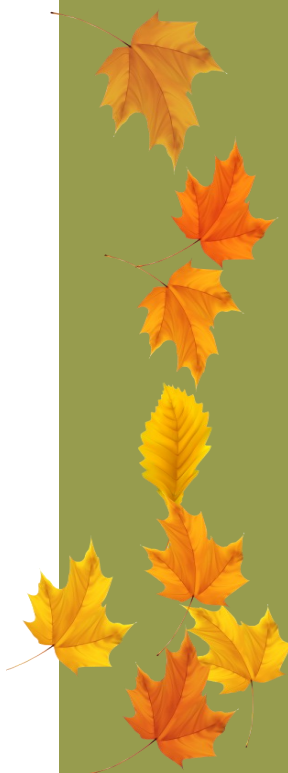
WFA covers the most critical aspects of providing safety and first aid in a wilderness setting. Adhering to the wisdom of the National Association for Search and Rescue (NASAR) and its guidelines, you will receive both theoretical and practical up-to-date training. The resulting certification is valid for 2 years. Must be 18 or older.

Russ Crispell has taught WFA and Wilderness First Responder for the American Red Cross, National Association of Search and Rescue, CDS, Inc. and American Safety and Health Institute (ASHI). He teaches at Niagara County Community College in the School of Nursing and Allied

Health multiple classes in Advance First Aid and CPR for Professional Rescuers. Russ also teaches academic courses in WFA at UB's Department of Environmental Studies and Sustainability. He is a 20+ year NYS Licensed Guide. He holds a BA in Physical Education and Science from UCF and a MS from SUNY Brockport.

Assisting Russ is Earth Spirit's Jon Roth (Naturalist), Joe Allen (Retired UB Professor), Alex Eisenhower (former EMT and guide), Don Sziumigala (EMT, UB Professor); former staff and volunteers.

This course is for members who are committed to ADK-NFC who will give back to our chapter by leading safe outings and educational workshops. 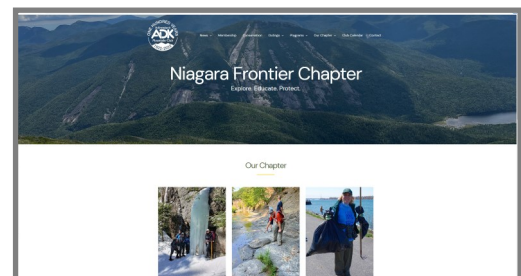

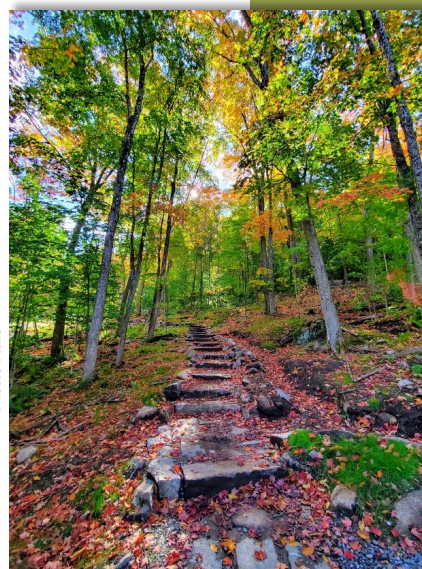
Fall in the Adirondacks

Grand Island Bike Ride, August 27th

Late August is, by far, the best way to experience summer in Western New York. Saturday's ride (August 27, 2022) was a perfect example of this - a cool, clear morning progressing into a warm sunny day, and a wonderful way to experience a bicycle ride around Grand Island.



Starting just off of East River with an informal breakfast with our awesome hosts, Margery and Tom Burkman, we rode counter-clockwise to our first quick stop at Buckhorn Island State Park. If you're a kayak enthusiast, note that there's a new launch there, so check it out - no more muddy feet getting into Woods Creek! Proceeding along East-West Park Road, we began to make good time (and great conversation) riding two abreast along the recently converted West River Parkway. We had the wind at our back, and sped along until we



reached Beaver Island State Park. Lots of things to see here - starting with checking out the Purple Martin Houses, then a bathroom break at the Nature Center, and then on along the paths and roads in the Park. No one racing cross country today, so we followed the trail past the River Lea house to one of their two Kayak Launches, this one located just by Ferry Village. A final push along East River Road with a quick break near the bridge finished off our 24 mile morning ride.

noon. Many thanks to Randy who arranged for the pizza and perfectly timed the delivery. Parking at the Eternal Flame lot, Randy wanted our group to experience a lesser known and traveled trail. We enjoyed some fall leaf changes, abundant White wood asters, the ever interesting Beech-drops, and on one tree, an unusual mass of white, moving "things" (later determined to be Beech woolly aphids, sometimes called Boogie-Woogie Bugs).

The roly-poly path was full of exposed tree roots, and there were a few areas that required slow and careful footing. Participants kept an eye out for these obstacles, and were



very helpful to others who needed a hand of assistance. Randy kept a watchful eye and managed the line whenever a gap appeared. The time went by quickly and we ended up hiking in excess of five miles which was pure joy.

Before leaving the parking lot, conversations continued with discussing several locations for the next great hike which will be advertised in the upcoming newsletters. We will hike in this beautiful National Natural Landmark, complete with old-growth forests and gorge views of Cattaraugus Creek.

Wear sturdy shoes, dress for the weather, and bring a snack.

Directions to the Trailhead on Point Peter Rd.: Take Route 62 to Gowanda. Turn Left on South Water St (First street south of the bridge over Cattaraugus Creek), which bends and becomes Commercial St, and then Palmer St. Turn Right on Broadway Rd; continue for about a mile. Turn Left on Point Peter Rd and drive about 2.4 miles to find the parking lot on the left past Forty Rd.

Oct 22nd: Nature Walk with Orlando Monaco at Sinking Pond Wildlife Sanctuary

Location: 400 Pine St., East Aurora, NY 14051

Time: 10am walk followed by lunch and discussion at 42 North Brewing Company, 25 Pine St., East Aurora, NY 14052

Join East Aurora resident and organizer of Friends of Sinking Ponds, Orlando Monaco, for an information-packed nature walk at this beautiful wildlife sanctuary. You will learn why he has pledged himself to help preserve and maintain this gem on the edge of East Aurora, NY.

Orlando and members of Friends of Sinking Ponds have worked tirelessly with little funding to upgrade this long-neglected property. Although maintained by the Village of East Aurora, this important preserve, which is frequented by migratory birds and home to varied wildlife, sorely needs upgrades to the parking area, entrance, and other areas.

This rich habitat has been studied by students from the University of Buffalo's Archaeological Field School (1960 and 2011), which revealed evidence of human habitation going back some 4,000 years. Students even found that the "evidence of the site suggests that some impressive prehistoric creatures might have once disturbed the now tranquil site," specifically, mastodons.

Orlando is an avid nature photographer, and he recommends participants bring binoculars and cameras (however, posting of pictures to social media sites is not recommended by Friends of Sinking Ponds as



it will undermine the integrity of the sanctuary).
