

Planning Your Winter Backpacking Trip

January 10, 2023, Education Workshop with Jonathan Coupal at 6:30 pm

Rather than another discussion about what gear to buy, this introductory session focuses on the winter season and planning steps you may want to take to ensure that you have a fun winter backpacking experience. Topics

include course/trail selection, weather planning, food preparation, and how to make the most of the equipment you already have!

Jonathan grew up in the Finger Lakes and started camping with his family as a child and began backpacking in earnest with a trip to the Adirondacks when he was 17 years old. Jonathan began pursuing his passions for the backcountry with his son through the local BSA, where he still trains new scoutmasters on outdoor trip planning and is a backpacking and camping merit badge counselor. Besides plenty of camping, backpacking, snowshoeing, skiing, kayaking, and canoeing in the Allegheny and Adirondack regions with family and friends, Jonathan has backpacked hundreds of miles in the Pacific Northwest, including a 6-day thru

hike of the Wonderland Trail on Mount Rainier in 2021. Jonathan and his wife Karen also enjoy bikepacking and bike touring, and in 2022 he completed the

GAP and C&O trails from Pittsburgh to Washington, DC. You can hear Jonathan's passion for outdoor adventures in his own voice on the "HYOH Podcast," a podcast about hammock camping which he cohosted from 2015 until



2020.

For our main program at 7:30, we welcome climber, Lauren Molinda, who will give a talk and slideshow



presentation on her March, 2022 trek to the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest peak on the African continent, and the tallest single free-standing mountain in the world.

ascent, Lauren will talk about what spiked her interest in climbing, her training regimen, and the international leadership group, Mountains and Marathons, an organization that inspired her to climb Kilimanjaro. We'll also learn about Lauren's success in raising money, while training for her climb, for the Girls Education Collaborative, a

Buffalo based non-profit that operates a girl's school in Tanzania.

When she's not climbing, Lauren co-owns and operates Riveter Design, a Buffalo-based advertising agency, celebrating its 10th anniversary this year. Riveter is heavily involved within the non-profit

and foundation community in Western New York, and won Best of Show at the 2022 Buffalo American Advertising Federation Awards for their work on the East Side Avenues Campaign, chronicling the impact of a \$65 million dollar investment throughout the four main business corridors on Buffalo's East Side. At Riveter, Lauren is responsible for business development, business operations, and strategic planning for key accounts.

Lauren lives in the village of East Aurora with her husband and 7 year old daughter.

Trustee Report

I'm the trustee for our chapter, which means I represent us on the Advisory Council board. The board will be meeting early in January to vote on a new Outings Guide which includes a new system for certifying outings leaders and lots of recommendations on how to run a good outing. The certification system is quite controversial and has left many people thinking that we may lose outings leaders. There has been a need for revisions in outing's leader training for years, and a couple of incidents lead to a discussion on who should develop the new guide. The chapters did not want ADK staff to do the guide, so the Advisory Council assigned a committee to work on it. They have worked for the past year to develop the draft guide. Our chapter's Executive Committee discussed it at our last meeting. We were concerned about the level of detail in it and about distinguishing what is required and what is suggested. Also we wondered what the Club's insurance company required. Of course a decision on any lawsuit would depend more on a jury than the insurance company. The Advisory Council wants ADK to pay for any training and certification programs, which is also an issue. Once a vote is taken the guide, re-

jected or not, will go to the club staff and board for further work. If you are interested I can send you the draft. I sent it out to the Executive Committee and a few people who have been trip leaders over the years. At our Executive Committee meeting we discussed using the guide, approved or not, as a base for providing monthly education programs on good practice in leading trips or exploring safely on your own.

The Club will be launching a capital campaign for the Cascade Center next year to raise money to renovate and improve the Center. Watch the Adirondac for details. A large number of grants have been received, but additional money will be needed. If you are traveling around Lake Placid stop by to take a look at what has been done so far. The Center is located on route 76 a few miles past the Adirondack Loi road. They will be up and running with lots of snow by the time you read this. They have ski rentals and you can purchase equipment. Skiing is free for members.



In Remembrance:

Dr. Gerald Rising (1927 – 2022)

It is with much sadness that we announce the passing For the last 30 years of his career, Gerry taught of a great and gentle man and a friend of the ADK-NFC community, Dr. Gerald Rising, Ph.D. Gerry passed away on December 9, 2022, at the age of 95.

An avid outdoorsman, Gerry climbed the 46 high peaks of the Adirondacks; hiked the Bruce Trail, the Finger Lakes Trail, and extensive sections of the Appalachian Trail; and circumnavigated each of the Great Lakes on his motor scooter. Gerry's love of the



Gerry was a presenter at several monthly ADK-NFC meetings in recent years, most recently, November 9, 2021. At the suggestion of chapter secretary Larry Beahan, program co-chairs Sue Kolasz and Pam Sander interviewed Gerry with questions submitted by members, which proved to be both entertaining and heartwarming.

Dr. Gerald R. Rising was an outstanding scholar by any measure. His academic background included a B.A. an Ed.M. in English from the University of Notre Dame and an M.S. and Ph.D. in mathematics from New York University. He also completed additional studies at Princeton University and Syracuse Univer-

Gerry's light shined brightest during his 65 years as an educator. Early in his career, he taught mathematics in several New York State high schools, including those in Brighton, Greece, Johnson City, and Warsaw. From there he moved on to serve as the K-12 Mathematics Coordinator for the Norwalk, Connecticut, Public Schools. His gifts as an educator eventually landed him teaching positions at the University of Minnesota, the University of Connecticut, New York University, and the University of Rochester.

mathematics at the State University of New York (SUNY) at Buffalo. In addition to his many teaching responsibilities, Gerry and Dr. Betty J.

> Krist co-founded the Gifted Mathematics Program, which was one of his greatest loves. In recognition of his many achievements as an educator, he was recognized as a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor Emeritus, the highest academic title in New York State, and

in 2014, Gerry was inducted into the New York State Mathematics Educators Hall of Fame.

In addition to his work as an educator, Gerry was a gifted and prolific author. He wrote numerous articles on mathematics as well as several best-selling books on mathematics and mathematics education. For 25 years, Gerry wrote the "Nature Watch" column in The Buffalo News, providing readers with well over 1,500 interesting articles on subjects as diverse as geology, astronomy, and birds (his favorite subject). He also wrote several books on birding, and toward the end of his life, he was a regular columnist for Buffalo Spree magazine.

Gerry was also a respected and articulate leader in the local environmental and birding communities. He seldom turned down an opportunity to express his concerns about our impacts on the natural world and made several presentations on this subject at ADK's monthly meetings.

There will be celebration of Gerry's life on January 23, 2023 at 1:30pm at Tifft Nature Preserve.

January 2, 2023 (Monday): Day After First Day Hike or Snowshoe Walk at Reinstein Woods Nature Preserve!

Approximate distance and time of 3.5 miles (2 hour duration)

Hiking poles highly recommended. Dress Appropriately (hiking shoes, warm clothing). Areas can be icy/slippery – yaks or micro spikes highly recommended (other than two overlooks, natural trails)

Bring water and snack

Level 1 Hike (C) Easy – Moderate (depending on conditions and ability)



Have other plans for New Year's Day? Feeling a little tired from your holiday celebrations? Already committed to a first day hike? Consider a "day after the first day " morning hike at beautiful Reinstein Woods led by Pam and Sue! Conveniently located at 93 Honorine Drive, Depew, NY 14043 on a 292-acre forested complex that also includes wetlands and ponds.

Purchased in 1932 by Dr. Victor Reinstein for a private nature sanctuary, by 1960 he had planted 30,000 trees, constructed nineteen ponds, marshes, and swamps. After Dr. Reinstein's 1984 death, his widow, Julia Boyer Reinstein, donated the reserve to The State of New York that assumed control in 1986.

The preserve is located within a developed suburban area and features a gorgeous environmental education center that offers programs for youths and adults all year round and operated by the DEC in partnership with the non-profit, Friends of Reinstein Woods.

The Mission of Friends of Reinstein Woods is to promote knowledge of nature through awareness, appreciation, and stewardship of the unique and diverse environment of Reinstein Woods and its programs.
